Ordinary Time?

As the celebrations of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany come to their conclusions, the Church now steps into the quieter rhythm of Ordinary Time. Far from being a dull or uneventful season, Ordinary Time offers us an invaluable gift: the chance to rest, reflect, and reconnect. After weeks of preparing, rejoicing, and celebrating some of the most profound mysteries of our faith, this period invites us to pause and catch our breath, both spiritually and practically.

The Advent season, with its anticipation of Christ's coming, is filled with expectation and busyness. Churches are bustling with preparations for carol services, nativity plays, and Christmas liturgies. Christmas itself brings joy and splendour, but it is often a season where everyone is pulled in multiple directions. The journey of Advent, the joy of Christmas, and the revelations of Epiphany often pass by in a flurry of activity. Ordinary Time gives us the breathing room to look back, to ponder what these seasons have taught us, and to discern how God is calling us to live out their truths in our everyday lives.

As we enter this season, let us embrace its quiet beauty. Let us rest in the knowledge that God is with us, not only in the grand celebrations but also in the stillness of ordinary days. Ordinary Time is not a step back but a step deeper – an invitation to live our faith fully and faithfully in the simplicity of the everyday.

Ordinary Time is anything but Ordinary!

Hemingford Abbots Parish Council Report January 2025

Hi everyone,

You may have heard that there have been a few changes at the Parish Council. After Peter, Phillip and Glen decided to step down, Eddie Halls and Richard Chamberlain applied to join and were successfully co-opted at the January meeting. Our thanks go to the departing counsellors for their service to the parish, and I am sure you will want to wish the new councillors well in their new positions.

Brett Mickelburgh (one of our District Councillors) announced that under new Government proposals, there is a possibility that Huntingdon District Council could be abolished and the services centralised into a larger unitary authority. He will keep us informed of progress, and specifically how this might affect our parish.

Two new planning applications have been submitted for Hemingford Park, intended to regularise the current planning breaches. There is no request for any 'Change of Use' in these applications. The majority of remedial actions have already been agreed with HDC and Historic England, but negotiations continue between HDC and the applicant over a request to remove the new tarmac in front of the spa building and replace this with something more appropriate for a heritage site. The Parish Council resolved to respond as 'neither for nor against the application', but to make the following points:

- HAPC strongly supports HDC's requirement that the newly laid tarmac is lifted and replaced with a more suitable surface in keeping with a heritage site.
- HAPC to request that HDC Building Control carries out an audit on the completed work to ensure that it has been carried out to the proposed specifications and meets the required standards

On a separate matter, HAPC will write to HDC Planning regarding the road that was built (without planning permission) across the front of the grade 2 star building; this sits outside of this planning application, and we believe has yet to receive appropriate planning permission.

A new LHI bid has been submitted for the junction of New Road and High Street (a known local accident blackspot) to extend the adjacent 20mph speed zone. Our thanks go to Jo Wills who helped prepare the application.

We were pleased to approve a request from the Hemingford Arts Group to have an information page on the Parish Council website, which will provide useful information to any interested parishioners.

Finally, we received a request from the Flower Festival Committee to allow dogs onto the playing field for the two days of the event (28th and 29th June). The Parish Council agreed to allow this, subject to a number of conditions: including that dogs must be kept on leads at all times, the play equipment is fenced off and kept separate, and there is scrupulous clean-up of the field at the end of each day. For the avoidance of doubt, the general ban on dogs entering the field at any other time will remain in place.

WI January 2025



There were only a select few at our first meeting of the year on Wednesday 8th January but our speaker was definitely worth braving the elements for! Jonathan Jones is a consultant orthopaedic surgeon, specialising in hand and wrist surgery. He is the co-lead of the BSSH (The British Society for Surgery of the Hand) LION (The Lilongwe Institute of Orthopaedic Neurosurgery) project to help heal the hands of Malawi.

Hands are vitally important for most activities and a hand injury for an individual can impact on the wellbeing of a whole family in such a poor country. Malawi is the 9th poorest country in the world with a life expectancy of 63 years (in comparison with 80 years in UK). There is 1 doctor to every 65,000 patients (cf 1/330 in UK).

Malawi has the third highest death rate in the world from road traffic accidents. Another major source of hand injuries is the panga knife, a type of machete, readily available and often wielded by subsistence farmers as they try to protect their precious crops from thieves. Old injuries can often be neglected which makes them more difficult to treat; the timely management of hand injuries can make a real difference.



The BSSH have an overseas committee and currently support ten overseas projects. The LION project has been running for 2 years now at a cost of around £90K/year. The project started within the old Kamuzu Central Hospital which was built in the 1970s but has had its own purpose-built unit since 2023. It is hoped that funding will be available to ensure this project continues for another 3 years.

Since the start of the project, a total of 47 volunteers (20 surgeons, 15 trainees and 13 therapists) have worked at LION. The team typically comprises a consultant, a trainee and a hand therapist. The role of the physiotherapists is important and integral to the success of surgery performed.

LION aspires to become self-sufficient in the provision of specialist hand services by the end of the five-year project in 2028. The team run two teaching session each week and already have locals working with them that were on the first courses they ran. The mission statement is all about collaboration – Educate, Enable, Empower.

Jonathan is clearly very passionate about the project and this came across in his talk. He finds the work professionally refreshing, spiritually inspiring and a tonic for his soul. He enjoys being part of a team working hard in a challenging setting. He particularly enjoys working in "the warm heart of Africa" with such happy, friendly people.

Recipe

Chicken tagine with spiced brussels sprouts & feta

Ingredients:

- 1 ½ tbsp coconut oil
- · 1 large red onion sliced
- 1 red pepper finely sliced
- · 3 garlic cloves finely chopped
- 10 chicken thighs fillets (boneless and skinless)
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp ground turmeric
- ½ tsp smoked paprika
- 1 tbsp tomato purée
- 250ml chicken stock
- · 6 dried apricots cut in half
- 175g canned chickpeas drained and rinsed
- ½ tsp cumin seeds
- · 275g brussels sprouts shredded
- 50g feta
- ½ small bunch coriander roughly chopped



Step 1

Heat 1 tbsp of the coconut oil in a large flameproof casserole dish over a medium heat. When melted and hot, add the onion, pepper and garlic. Cook, stirring regularly, for 3 -4 mins or until just starting to soften. Increase the heat to maximum and add the chicken thighs. Fry everything together for about 3 mins, stirring occasionally.

Step 2

Sprinkle in the spices, squeeze in the tomato purée and fry, stirring almost constantly, for 1 min. Pour in the stock and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to a simmer and partially cover with a lid. After 30 mins, add the dried apricots and chickpeas, and continue to simmer for a further 10 mins.

Step 3

While the tagine is bubbling away, heat the remaining 1/2 tbsp of coconut oil in a frying pan over a high heat. When melted, add the cumin seeds, toast for 10 secs, then add the shredded sprouts. Fry the sprouts over the high heat, stirring almost constantly, for 5 mins, by which time they should have softened and browned in places.

Step 4

Serve the tagine in a large bowl, scatter over the fried sprouts, crumble over the feta and finish with the coriander.

Over Christmas and New Year the transport team has presented to:

- a) the Mayor of the Combined Authority, Dr Nik Johnson,
- b) the CEO of HDC, Michelle Sacks,
- c) and finally posed a question to the Transport Infrastructure Committee (TIC) of the Combined Authority with the Mayor present, about support for our sustainable Hoppa pilot proposal.

We received encouraging feedback from TIC and are continuing to liaise with them on the possibility of part-funding our pilot minibus scheme. The next stage will involve keeping our parish councils informed and engaged with the scheme.

We are hoping for funding from several sources, which together with our own village fund-raising, will help demonstrate the viability, reliability and sustainability of an hourly mini-bus into St Ives. In the meantime, we will be looking to start our fund-raising which we hope will engage all villagers in some fun activities.


