Swallow a sky full of stars! Then close your eyes and taste their mystery Feel in yourself The cold immensity Of all the space that lies among, between, around that far faint light. Taste all the frostiness Of night.

I think you will agree with me that the Poet wonderfully expresses the wonder & beauty of creation.

I find that this and her other poems breathe forth a light that is both heavenly and earthly and remind us that the simplest gifts of our ordinary lives are filled with the grandeur and presence of God.

Hemingford Abbots Parish Council Report February 2025

Hi everybody,

Our latest parish council meeting was held on Monday, 24th February as follows:

A new planning application was considered for the land between Houghton Grange and The How (construction of up to 120 new homes). The parish council previously objected to this development in October 2024 based on the increased risk of flooding, that it was in breach of the neighbourhood and local plans (removing the gap between the existing conurbations), and also the high density of the housing at 28 properties per hectare. The latest proposal increases this even further to 30 properties per hectare, whilst failing to address our other concerns, so we voted once again to oppose the application.

On general planning, we discussed the new National Planning Policy Framework – this government initiative has increased the annual new homes target for Huntingdonshire from 844 homes to 1213. The new framework also introduces something called 'tilted balance', which means that applications are more likely to be passed unless there is a compelling reason for refusal (such as flooding). For more detail on the up and coming changes to planning policy please contact the clerk for a copy of the HDC NPPF presentation.

A presentation was made by Hemingford's Community Bus Project regarding the plans to introduce a 16 seater hoppa bus to the Hemingford villages, to run every hour to St Ives and back (various routes). A 4 month pilot would cost in the region of £62,000, and the team are starting to explore potential funding options.

We are concerned about the return of flooding to Royal Oak Lane, surface water around the village and also the general state of the roads, especially on Rideaway near to the flyover / A1307. We agreed to write to the authorities concerned to raise these issues and try to secure some early action.

Residents have asked about the status of the greenhouse at Hemingford Park, for which a planning application was refused in December 2023. Our clerk will make enquiries at HDC Planning, so we can all understand the process and timescales involved when a building is constructed but then fails to secure approval.

We are preparing for our Annual Parish Meeting, on 30th April, which is an opportunity for parishioners to inform the Parish Council of what is important to them. There has been much talk of the Latttenburys of late and so we agreed to invite the developer to come and make a presentation at the APM. so that we can all be better informed about the plans and timings.

Finally, it is time for our annual litter pick! We have fixed the date for Sunday 23rd March (to avoid Mother's Day and also the school half-term), so please watch for the notices and contact our clerk if you are able to join us. We would really appreciate your help!

House of Spies or Pink Gin Percy, Bonzo and Crommie



Roger Leivers, local historian, gave a very interesting talk on local property Farm

Hall in Godmanchester and its role as an SOE (Special Operations Executive) training centre during World War 2.

Farm Hall was built around 1700 for the recorder of Huntingdonshire. Much later the hall was requisitioned by the RAF and a spy school was established in 1942. Many locals thought it was a parachute training centre but it was a place of calm and refuge for those agents about to be sent abroad from RAF Tempsford and for those returning from dangerous missions.

We were introduced to the many interesting and brave characters involved in the setting up and running of the house including Wing Commander Cautley Naysmyth Shaw (Pink Gin Percy) and Squadron Leader Bruce Bonsey (Bonzo). Agents who ran the Comet Line, an escape route from France, and many intelligence officers passed through the centre, by now known as HMS Pembroke 3.



Operation Sussex, one of the biggest operations, numbering 100 agents, was instigated from Godmanchester before D Day to assess German positions, fuel supplies, shipping and any other details useful for the allied landings.

Some of the most famous or infamous residents of Farm Hall were several German nuclear scientists who, unknown to them, were bugged and revealed the extent of their research into Germany's ability to produce nuclear weapons. This is now known as Operation Epsilon. Roger has so much information about the history of Farm Hall and gives various talks on other aspects of the war activities.

All agreed it was a very entertaining and informative talk.

Recipe

Fluffy American Pancakes

Ingredients

- 135g/4¾oz plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- ½ tsp **salt**
- 2 tbsp caster sugar
- 130ml/4½fl oz milk
- 1 large egg, lightly beaten
- 2 tbsp melted butter (allowed to cool slightly), plus extra for cooking

To serve

- maple syrup
- butter



Method

- 1. Sift the flour, baking powder, salt and caster sugar into a large bowl. In a separate bowl or jug, lightly whisk together the milk and egg, then whisk in the melted butter.
- 2. Pour the milk mixture into the flour mixture and, using a fork, beat until you have a smooth batter. Any lumps will soon disappear with a little mixing. Let the batter stand for a few minutes.
- 3. Heat a non-stick frying pan over a medium heat and add a knob of butter. When it's melted, add a ladle of batter (or two if your frying pan is big enough to cook two pancakes at the same time). It will seem very thick but this is how it should be.
- 4. Wait for about 3 minutes until the top of the pancake begins to bubble, and the edges begin to set. Flip it over and cook for another two minutes until both sides are golden brown and the pancake has risen to about 1cm/½in thick. If the pancake is too dark, reduce the heat slightly for the next round.
- 5. Repeat until all the batter is used up. You can keep the pancakes warm in a low oven, but they taste best fresh out the pan.
- 6. Serve with lashings of real maple syrup and extra butter, if you like.

Hemingford Abbots Village Lunch - Tuesday March 18th

The next Village Lunch is on Tuesday March 18th. Fiona Winter is leading the team of cooks and helpers – and there will be undoubtedly a delicious lunch for everyone. At the time of going to press, the menu is outlined as chicken cassoulet for the main course and key lime pie for dessert. Please look out for recipe details in the Community News email from Sue nearer the time.

Last month there were 59 diners for the February lunch, so let's hope for another good turn-out in March.

At the February lunch, Beryl, our Treasurer for the Village Lunch, announced a price rise. From March the cost of the Lunch will be £7. (Please note this is cash only as we do not have card payment facilities).

The price has had to rise due to a combination of inflationary pressures – the Chancellor has recently put an extra £1 of duty on a bottle of wine, the Village Hall hire costs have risen in 2025, food costs generally have risen and the insurance premium (which is due in the autumn) is expected to rise. Despite the price rise, we hope everyone will continue to see the Village Lunch as good value and an enjoyable community event.

And lastly, for anyone new to the Lunch, please do let one of the organisers or team leaders know if you have a dietary requirement – e.g. gluten free or vegetarian. The cooks are very happy to prepare dishes accordingly if they know in advance, but generally the Village Lunch does not have the capacity to run as a restaurant and have these options available otherwise. (For existing diners, the cooks are already prepared each month).
