

The Venerable Bede: Scholar of Wearmouth-Jarrow

Last month I introduced you to Thomas Merton, this month I'd like to introduce you to arguably most important Christian in British history. Bede's day is celebrated in May so what better chap to think about as the days grow warmer and spring turns slowly to summer. St Peter's in Monkwearmouth, one of my curacy Churches was home to the Wearmouth Jarrow monastery and the very archway through which Bede enter the monastery still stands to this day.

Bede, often known as the Venerable Bede, was an English monk, scholar, and theologian who lived from around 673 to 735 AD. He spent nearly all his life in the twin monasteries of Wearmouth and Jarrow under the rule of Benedict Biscop and later Ceolfrith. These monasteries were renowned centres of learning, boasting one of the best libraries in Europe at the time. It was within this rich intellectual environment that Bede composed works which would influence the Christian world for centuries.

Bede is best known for writing, *The Ecclesiastical History of the English People*, completed in 731 AD. As a result of this book he earned the title "Father of English History" and remains a crucial source for understanding early English Christianity and the conversion of the Anglo-Saxons. Bede's meticulous approach, using oral testimonies, letters, and earlier chronicles, established standards of historical writing that were advanced for his time.

One of Bede's most significant intellectual contributions was his work in chronology and the calendar. While he did not invent the calendar as such, he played a major role in refining the Christian understanding of time. In his work *De Temporibus* and its later expansion *De Temporum Ratione*, Bede explained how to calculate the date of Easter, the most important feast in the Christian calendar. The western and eastern Churches celebrate Easter at two different weeks due to adhering to different calendars, this year for the first for many where the two dates for Easter coincided with each other. This involved complex lunar and solar calculations and required reconciling the Jewish lunar calendar with the Roman solar one. He was instrumental in promoting the *Anno Domini* (AD) dating system, devised by Dionysius Exiguus in the 6th century, which counted years from the supposed birth of Christ. Bede's popularization of this system in his historical and theological works helped it become the dominant dating method in Western Europe.

Bede's scholarship went beyond history and chronology. He wrote extensively on theology, biblical commentary, grammar, poetry, and science. He helped preserve and transmit classical knowledge and was deeply concerned with accurate education in Latin, essential for biblical studies.

Bede died on May 26, 735, and this day is observed as his feast day in the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican Communion, and other Christian traditions. He was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Leo XIII in 1899—the only native of Britain to hold the title—recognizing his exceptional learning and piety.

Bede was one of the most interesting characters I learned about while living in Sunderland, his legacy is one we might not all be aware of but it is one we all benefit from.

Hemingford Abbots Parish Council Report April 2025

Hi everybody,

This is a shorter report this month, as we do not meet again until Monday 19th May.

It is very gratifying to have Michelle Sacks, the CEO of HDC visit us to discuss the forthcoming restructure of councils across the county. This could have large implications for us all (who our local authority will be and their priorities, potential disruptions, what local services are provided, how planning will work, future levels of council tax) and I would urge you all to take some time to read about this if you were not make the meeting.

Similarly, we have representatives of the developer of the 'Land South of the A1307' attending our Annual Parish Meeting on April 30th. If this goes ahead, it will be the largest change in the parish population in our history, and currently you have an opportunity to interact over how this might affect your amenity, and what assets or safeguards you might wish to ask for.

The APM is also an opportunity to learn about the excellent work that is undertaken across the parish by your fellow citizens, and to raise any points that you wish the Parish Council to be aware of and consider.

There have been some reports of officials (possibly the Environment Agency) taking to the river near the Bailey Bridge: we are trying to establish what is taking place and why, and we will report back as soon as we have any more information.

On other matters, it is good to see the potholes being filled in at pace around Rideaway and the bridge. There are still lots of areas of road damage across the parish, and I hope you will take 5 minutes to report these on the potholes website (which is advertised on the parish website under 'Report It'. The link is also shown below:

Similarly, please keep on reporting to us any things that need our attention (faulty streetlights, broken or damaged gates, overgrown footpaths): the sooner we know, the quicker we can address the issue!

Did you know that in the time of Marie-Antoinette the favourite cake was Kugelhopf.

Records show that at the **Flower Festival** the favourite cake is coffee & walnut and the time-honoured favourite of Victoria Sponge. The origin of Victoria Sponge goes back to the 17th century and is nothing to do with the Queen of the same name!

Whatever type of cake you bake we'd love to taste it and share it with our visitors at the Flower Festival. Our target of 300 is some way off....

Oh, and scones go down very well too! There follows a tried and tested recipe I got from Pam. Yummy. What's your recipe 'to die for'?

Scones (Jenny Bliss - kind permission of Pam Bartlett)

Ingredients

11b SR flour1 teaspoon salt (if used)4oz cold butter - cut into cubes1 teaspoon baking power2 oz caster sugar7 fl oz milk

Method

- Mix flour, baking powder and salt (if used) in Kenwood fitted with K beater.
- Add butter and mix until it resemble fine breadcrumbs.
- Add sugar and mix.
- Add milk and combine until you have a dough.
- Turn out on a floured surface, sprinkle with flour and press mixture into a round approx 1" thick.
- Cut with size of cutter your choice (I use a 2.5" cutter and this quantity makes 9).
- Place on a floured baking tray and bake for 8-9minutes.
- Remove from over and place on cooling rack.
- Sprinkle with icing sugar.

Delicious served with jam and clotted cream

Note - may be frozen as soon as they have cooled down. Remove from the freezer for about 10 -15mins then freshen in over at 200 C for about 5 mins.

Once sated with chocolate, Cathy led us through the making of these small easter baskets. Using simple paper folding techniques, these baskets can be decorated to suit and hung from twigs over Easter.
