

It seems to me that at the moment every time I open a periodical, magazine or even the Church Times someone is quoting the Irish Poet W.B Yeats. I find his writing rather depressing and so it fails to leave me uplifted.

With the very hot weather nature seems to be giving the impression that Autum has already arrived. Trees are shedding leaves, the Harvest is well advanced and in addition my two friendly squirrels are making continuous visits to my Walnut tree to garner nuts to store for the winter.

As we move into September with the signs that nature is sending because of the lack of rain, thoughts naturally turn to the season of Autumn. For me and possibly many of you this makes me think of the poet John Keats and his Poem Ode to Autum which paints such a vivid and magical picture of Autumn. The opening words of his poem seem to say everything about Autumn.

"Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness"

His poem not only brings Autum to life in our imagination but encourages us to see the unique beauty of the season leaving us uplifted.

This all leads me to reflect on how nature and for many gardeners is beneficial to both our souls and health. The positive effects on our health and particularly our mental health that just being outside and certainly if linked to some activities are very well documented. Just being in the fresh air and enjoying sights, smells and tastes is a bonus. If we are also able to discover a peaceful sanctuary in our gardens or the countryside, somewhere to escape from the world for a short space of time and provide the opportunity to immerse ourselves in nature, identifying what God has created then our health and souls will benefit.

The Poet George Herbert wrote: -

"By all means use sometime to be alone Salute thy self: see what thy soul doth wear. Dare to look in thy chest, for tis thine own: And tumble up and down what thou find'st there Who cannot rest till he good fellows finde. He quits the house and turns out of doors his mind." Dr Charles Moseley, a Fellow of Hughes Hall, Cambridge, I think painted a tranquil picture of Autumn when he wrote this week: -

"As we sat outside over an evening meal it suddenly becomes clear that our beloved swifts whose joyful sounds fill the summer skies at evening had left for Africa. When they leave us, you notice the nights beginning to draw in on us as the year ages. He concludes by quoting Dug Hammarsjkold (a past Secretary General of the United Nations) "For all that has been, Thanks, for all that shall be. Yes".

My prayer for you all is that this Autum may see you enjoying nature, good health and sufficient space to allow the soothing flow of nature to have its healing power on your body and soul.

Hemingford Abbots Parish Council Report August 2025

Hi everyone,

The last four weeks have been a particularly busy period for the parish council, with 2 council meetings and also facilitating an open session for the village.

Much of our activity surrounded the latest planning application for 'Change of Use' for Hemingford Park (25/01248/FUL|Change of use from dwelling (Use Class C3) & agricultural land to a wellness centre (Class E) and wedding and events venue (Sui Generis) with guest sleeping accommodation and parking).

At our parish council meeting on 28th July, we decided to conduct an anonymous consultation of the parish to better understand the views of Hemingford Abbots residents on this matter before we deliberated on the application. Over 130 responses were submitted, with 89% expressing 'some concerns' with the application (in particular 'noise' and 'traffic') - and 74% of those who responded said that an open meeting would be beneficial.

An open meeting was held at the village hall on Saturday 16th August, with approximately 60 people attending.

Following the open meeting, Hemingford Abbots Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting on Wednesday 20th August where the parish council voted unanimously to oppose the application. A copy of our objection letter can be found on the HDC planning portal or alternatively, it can be requested from the Parish Clerk, email parishclerk@hemingford-abbots.org.uk.

Hemingford Abbots Parish Council has also asked HDC to 'call in' this application to the Development Management Committee and, if HDC agrees the request, it will allow a wider debate of the application with the public present. At the time of writing, we await a formal response from HDC to our request.

The parish council has also been considering an application to 'normalise' the new track / road on the same site, 25/01451/CLED Certificate of existing lawful use for access tracks, which we have similarly agreed to oppose.

In preparation, we held a meeting with Dews' management team, which resulted in a proposal for a daily, frequent and reliable timetabled service. Furthermore The Cock pub is supporting any efforts on the Hoppa team's part to make this bus service a reality. Watch out for in-pub ads for a team to 'drive' this initiative.

WI trip to Godmanchester Community Plant Nursery

We were lucky to have a warm, sunny evening for our summer outing in August this year! Twenty-two of us met at 6 o'clock at Godmanchester Community Plant Nursery where Oscar Jeakings, the nursery manager, took us for a tour of the 4.5-acre site. As many of you will remember, from Oscar's talk to us in October 2023, the nursery and grounds are run by the Town Council with the aim of involving and educating as much of the local community in gardening and the natural environment as possible.

There is a large team of volunteers that get involved with all manner of jobs from weeding to vegetable planting, seed sowing to fruit harvesting, mulching to grass cutting.





We started our tour in the green house where the seeds are sown and seedlings are potted up. Here Oscar showed us two different redwood saplings that are being nurtured ready to plant out in the grounds. Oscar also gave us a sneak peak of a tree that is to be unveiled this weekend: it is a sapling from a tree that survived the Hiroshima bombing in August 1945. Green Legacy Hiroshima have honoured Godmanchester by giving them a sapling from the ginkgo biloba, one of only 147 worldwide, in recognition of the part the town played in housing ten German scientists at Farm Hall, in West Street, 80 years ago.

We meandered through the areas close to the cafe and shop with vibrant planters containing alstroemeria, rudbeckia and alliums and rows of dahlias and echinacea waiting to be bought.









There was a drought garden, a winter aspect garden, a newly dug pond and a vegetable garden to take in before we walked down, through the orchard with over 20 varieties of local heritage fruit trees, to the wilder end of the site. Here we found the bee hives, a dead hedge, a wild flower meadow, a nuttery and an area of mixed woodland - a lot to explore.

Returning to the Muddy Trowel Café we all enjoyed tea or coffee and a selection of delicious cakes. Many then returned to the sales area to buy a plant or two before heading home. For those that weren't able to join us and would like to visit, the nursery is open from Tuesday to Saturday 10 am to 3pm with the café open Thursday to Saturday 10am to 2pm. Dates for our diary: the nursery will be hosting Godmanchester Town show on Saturday 6th September and Apple Day will take place on Saturday 11th October. Enjoy!

Three-cheese scones

Makes: 6 giant scones

Prepare: 15 mins Cook: 15 mins Total time: 30 mins

Ingredients

- 50g butter, cold and cubed, plus extra for greasing
- 250g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 100g Waitrose Mature Cheddar Cheese
- 100g No.1 Vintage Smoked Red Fox
- 50g essential Waitrose feta
- ½ tsp sea salt flakes, crushed
- 1 tsp nigella seeds, plus extra for sprinkling
- 150ml whole milk, plus extra for brushing



Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 220°C, gas mark 7 and place a large baking tray in the oven to heat up. Grease another slightly smaller baking tray with butter, then dust with a little flour.
- 2. Sift the flour and baking powder into a large bowl. Add the butter and rub in with your fingertips until it resembles rough breadcrumbs.
- 3. Coarsely grate the Cheddar, then add to the bowl, reserving 25g. Coarsely grate the Red Leicester and crumble the feta. Add both to the bowl with the sea salt and nigella seeds. Mix to combine.
- 4. Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients, then add the milk and mix with a round-bladed knife to make a soft dough. Turn out onto a lightly floured work surface, then knead gently, just to smooth the surface.
- 5. Roll or pat the dough out to a thickness of at least 2cm, then stamp out circles with a 7-8cm straight-edged round cutter. Press the trimmings back together and reroll a couple of times as needed to make 6 scones. Place onto the greased and floured tray.
- 6. Brush the top of each scone with a little milk, then scatter with the reserved Cheddar and extra nigella seeds. Put the tray on top of the preheated baking tray in the oven and bake the scones for 12-15 minutes or until risen and golden. Serve warm, if possible.

Cook's tip

Make them mini: If a more elegant approach is required, use a 4-5cm cutter instead. Press the dough out to a thickness of about 1.5cm, then make 16-18 rounds, reusing the trimmings as before. Bake for 10-12 minutes on the preheated tray, as above.
